

Learning Objective Checklist*

Here are several questions you can use as a guideline/checklist to help you assess your learning objectives:

Does the learning objective stem from a course goal?
Does it clearly describe and define the knowledge, skill, or ability required
achieved by the student at the end of the course or program?
Can you identify the action word? Is it measurable and observable?
Can you identify the acceptable level of performance?
Is the learning objective student-centered rather than teaching-centered? Does
the statement describe what a student will DO?
Is it specific and simply stated?
Does the learning objective match instructional activities and assessments?
Are you able to collect accurate and reliable data for the stated objective?
Is it stated so that more than one measurement method can be used?
Can the objective be used to identify areas to improve?
Given all stated course learning objectives, do they accurately reflect overall the
key results of your course or program?
