External Peer Benchmarks	Allows you to compare your students to larger groups	Difficult to find appropriate peer groups	Data may not always be available for sharing
Best Practices Benchmarks	motivating	such comparisons can also be frustrating because change takes time and is success can be difficult to replicate	aspirational
Historical Trends Benchmarks	allow us to detect the positive or negative effects of changes at the institution over time	may become less and less relevant	Some change may be outside the control of the institution
Productivity Benchmarks	May help control costs	savings doesn't always lead to better outcomes	
Value-added benchmarks	Can best measure the change over time	Ignores absolute criteria (students may still leave without knowing the LOs)	motivation, lack of availability and outliers may affect results
Capability benchmarks	May be more focused on individual student needs	Very difficult to measure reliably	May be useful on a case by case basis
